Dates were decided for the year's meetings and Diane emailed the information out to all regional members. These are June 25, July 23, Aug 20, Sept 17, Oct 15, and Nov 19 2022. Visiting Printmakers most welcome.



On 23 rd April our first meeting at the Whanganui Intermediate School Art Room was held. Those attending were impressed with the room and its facilities. As a koha it was decided to replace the old metal bed on the school's Jack Thompson Press. Nine attended including two from Taranaki and four from Manawatu and three locals. Diane Harries showed us how to make a double concertina book incorporating recycled and old prints and after lunch Marty demonstrated how to register and edition using a frisket. Composition and other details were discussed with those who brought along sketches and ideas of their work. Because of the central location and availability of the venue it was decided to hold the rest of the year's print days at the Whanganui Intermediate School Art Room. The Art Teacher has achieved a balance of exciting and innovative student work within an ordered and tidy environment, which has great appeal.

As Julia's daughter Katherine is Principal of the school she is happy for us to be there and personally unlocks gates and doors for easy access each print day.

Saturday 21st May was our latest get together and despite bad weather conditions four members from Manawatu joined five from Whanganui. A show and tell session of Bestiary work ready for a first trial print and others who had completed the edition created a discussion about recommended ink types for differing print processes. Marty spent time showing how to sharpen tools and also fielded many print questions from those still working on their plates. Diane demonstrated the 'Shrigley' option for binding the Bestiary Book. At our next meeting in June we look forward to seeing more completed images for the book.

It has been a pleasure welcoming Taranaki members to our print days. Including printmakers from their region is a given and we also look forward to participating in coming events in their area.

Wellington Report – Margaret-Ann Barnett

2022 is shaping up to be a good year for local printmakers, despite the challenges of Covid. We've got a small planning group up and running and have events underway.

'Spring into Print' – Proposal for a Wellington Print Exhibition We've had a great response from members to a proposal to apply to Thistle Hall for an exhibition, which we hope to run in early 2023. The aim will be to promote printmaking and inspire viewers with the possibilities offered by the vast range of printmaking techniques. Applications must be submitted six months in advance, so we'll begin planning shortly.

Establishing a Wellington printmakers 'community of practice'

On May 15 we held the first of five printmaking sessions we'll run on the third Sunday of the month in The Learning Connexion print room. The aim is to encourage printmakers in the region to collaborate, learn and share their expertise. We had such a great response (26 people registered) that we're running morning and afternoon sessions with a shared lunch.







Day one was a great success. Marci led a monoprint demo for the morning session and Linda led the demo in the afternoon. We'll review the initiative at the final September session and plan from there, which may include continuing the monthly sessions and running full weekend workshops.

There has been a lot going on for printmakers in the Waikato region recently. With workshops, exhibitions and a studio trail. Many Waikato printmakers had signed up in 2021 to participate in discussions and/or workshops at Printopia. This postponed event was able to go ahead at the beginning of May at the Corban's Estate Arts Centre. The venue is a great environment to work and experiment. The Letterpress workshop, hosted by Graham Judd took place on a Sunday morning and gave people the opportunity to produce an A3 sized poster of their own design.

Each participant had their own tray of typefaces to work with. This was a fantastic opportunity with Graham patiently guiding 6 participants through the Letterpress process.

Another event postponed from 2021 - NZPPA was hosted by The Hamilton Gardens, a venue that has previously been very successful for the exhibition of this national award. Printmaking featured prominently in the award exhibition with work by Mark Graver, Marie Strauss and Kim Lowe among others. Organised by Waikato Society of Arts and judged by Ed Hanfling this award continues to attract high calibre contemporary art practitioners in both paint and print media. Look out for the 2023 submission and award dates.

An artist working both in paint and print is Katie Blundell. With a studio in Clevedon, Auckland, Katie identifies with, and draws strongly on the farming community that surrounds her. Her exhibition "Country Air" is currently exhibited at Wallace Gallery Morrinsville so if you are in the area make sure you head in to see her work.

We were there representing Imprint Gallery which sells PCANZ members original prints as well as non members - maybe I should make that a requirement! It was so good to meet other printmakers and see their work. The talks, demonstrations and workshops were great. Corban's Estate Art Centre was the inspiration for the art hub at the Historic Village in Tauranga where I have the gallery. Nowhere near as extensive and not all artists studios but Simone Anderson at the Incubator works hard to expand it. I have moved my press to the gallery so I can print while I am there. I am printing mostly lino cuts and copper sulphate etchings and maybe demonstrating what is meant by an original print. Sadly Sally Thrush our collograph maestro is moving to Matakana. Our small group, which meet once a month at the Artery at the Historic Village will really miss her - a good reason for us to make a trip to visit her. Exchanging ideas and information is what makes meeting once a month so enjoyable. The Artery has an excellent large press we can use. Our monthly print club is our winter workshop. I demonstrated tetrapack printing at our last meeting and each of us brings something to each meeting to share. Janet and I are involved with the Tauranga Art Society - over 200 members and 3, maybe 4 printmakers but we are there in the twice monthly exhibitions validating original prints. Yes its "real art!"

Gisborne Report – Jean Johnston

Another successful 'new to printmaking' workshop was taught by Teressa Matthews, during May. The participants made etched aluminium plates. We promoted the programme using the Artists' Society Facebook and in the Gisborne Herald's Thursday's Art Magazine.

Teressa wrote:

'The workshop will give you an introduction to metal plate etching with aluminium plates and the intaglio printmaking process. We'll use different ways to apply line and tone and texture to the plate and print using an etching press. We will use shape and form with handmade stencils and print with the print process of monotype. Both these processes allow for painterly and gestural types of mark making.

The workshop is suitable to all levels of experience and will cover plate preparation, applying resists and etching in copper sulphate/salt solution.'

We are planning another printmaking focus for June. Group members travelled to Napier to see the very special Francoise Gilot exhibition. Many thanks to the Council for its support in bringing this to CAN.

Celebrating PCANZ Printmakers

Exhibition: Artful Narratives

In the gallery space, artist books are often overlooked, presented in a way with no context or indication of how the public should interact with them. *Artful Narratives* is a collection of artist books created by Auckland based artist Toni Hartill between 2016 and 2021 that demonstrate the conceptual complexity and exquisite materiality that Hartill has achieved in this medium. This is her first solo show, pulling together several series that form a larger body of work telling a story of the importance of taking notice of and protecting our natural environment. Until now, many of the pieces have either been hidden away or have been travelling in group shows, so this is the first time they can be seen alongside one another.

The idea for the exhibition was inspired by *Out of the Cupboard*, a group show of artist books at the Angela Morton Room in 2020, which Hartill co-curated with Toni Mosley to shine a light on this exciting area of printmaking. Hartill started exploring artist books in 2016 after attending workshop with Australian master printer Dianne Fogwell. The transition from creating two-dimensional to three-dimensional work came naturally to Hartill whose background involved a degree in art and design that included furniture design and model making. She enjoys working with her hands and is always experimenting with new things; leatherwork, knitting, crochet. Problem solving has always been part of her creative process. As a child she remembers designing and building a dolls house from scratch, including creating all the furniture and fittings for it.

When developing an idea, Hartill moves intuitively between different media, usually starting with the concept and what she wants to say. First, she explores ideas through drawing which then informs the chosen printmaking technique. Once she starts the print process she works spontaneously, allowing ideas to build on unexpected results, sparking new ideas and following new tangents as they arise. Unlike traditional printmaking, which embraces the multiplicity of print to produce editions, Hartill sees the multiple as a means of creating that allows her to be more experimental and playful. Unlike a painting, a printed surface can be cut, layered, and folded, adding to the narrative of the work. One example of this is her book *Remanent*, which came about when she was deinstalling a series of flat, square format prints, which she piled up into a stack. She was enthralled by the way they looked together, prompting her to recreate a similar stack, embellishing pages with fabric, stitching, and cutout windows to entice the viewers to rummage through and spark their imagination.

Hartill has always been drawn to the rich mark-making potential of printmaking. She had her first opportunity to fully explore this during her first teaching job where she had to teach three-colour reduction woodblock print to a class of over thirty Year 11 high school students. Having to be one step ahead to be able to explain this complex brainteaser of creating an image backwards and in reverse while progressively destroying the plate as you go was an exciting challenge that kept her on her toes. There was another teacher in the department who was also keen on learning printmaking so they would experiment on the press between classes and after school, creating a resource folder about what was possible and what to avoid.

When she left teaching to focus on her arts practice, her first goal was to create community by meeting other printmakers. She enrolled in a beginners' printmaking course at Corban Estate Arts Centre and from that was invited to join the local Waitakere Printers Ink group where she had the opportunity to exhibit in group shows. She then started attending events run by the Print Council Aotearoa NZ (PCANZ), which she joined and subsequently became their Auckland Regional Rep. This role provided an invaluable experience not only for developing her knowledge of printmaking but for meeting inspiring, likeminded printmakers who have become close friends she can share ideas with. She discovered the importance of community to her creative practice.

Having stepped down as regional rep earlier this year, Hartill now has more time to focus on her arts practice. The 2021 lockdown resulted in *Artful Narratives* being postponed after months of planning. During this time, she lacked inspiration to create, felt empty and contemplated packing it all in. Now that her show is finally up, it has cleared space in her head to think about new directions, colour palettes, and pursue opportunities that have presented themselves including another solo show, live interviews, an artist residency, and a few collaborative projects. *Artful Narratives* will be on show until 2 June at Angela Morton Room, Level 1 Takapuna Library. You'll have the chance to hear her talk in more depth about each narrative on Thursday 7 April & Friday 22 April at 11am.
